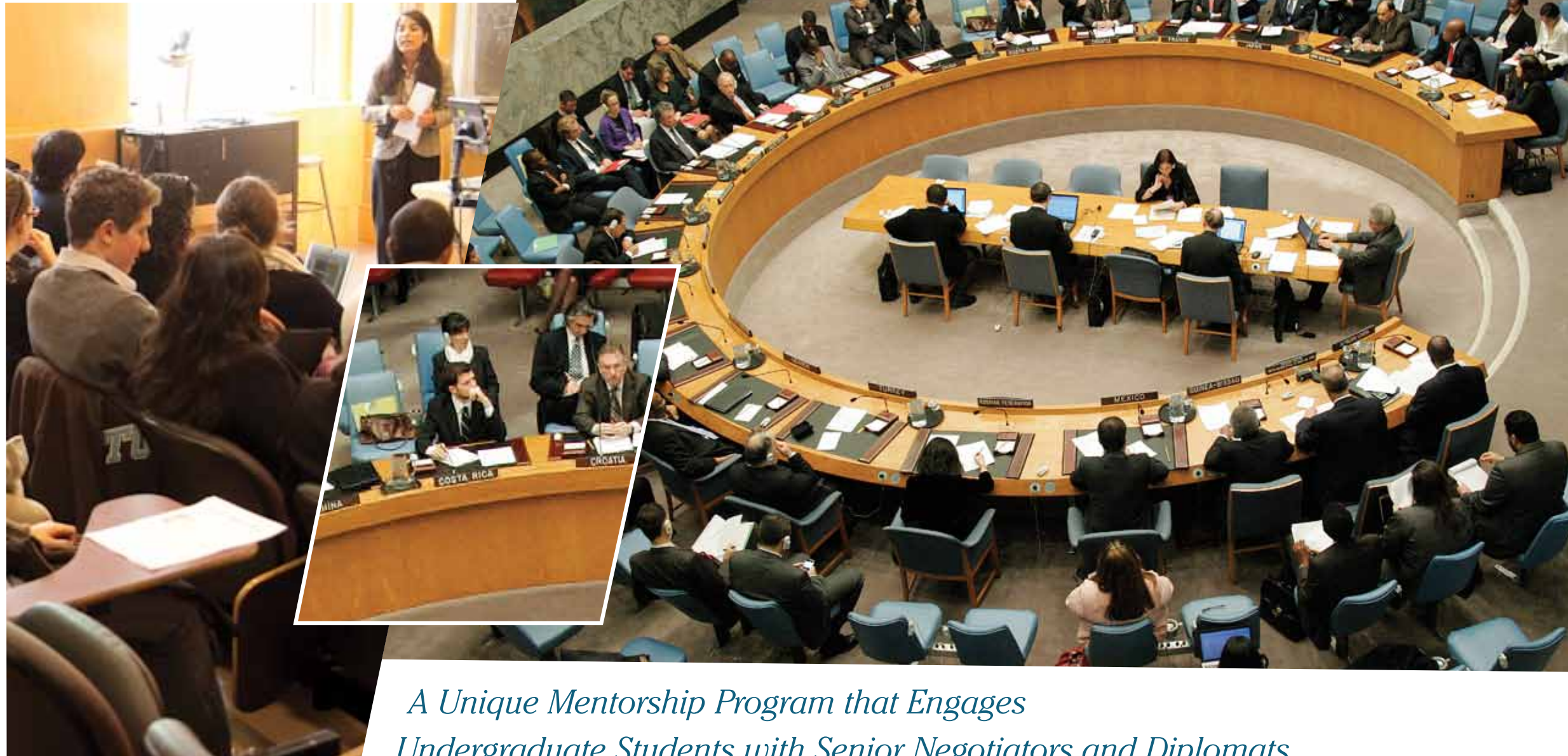

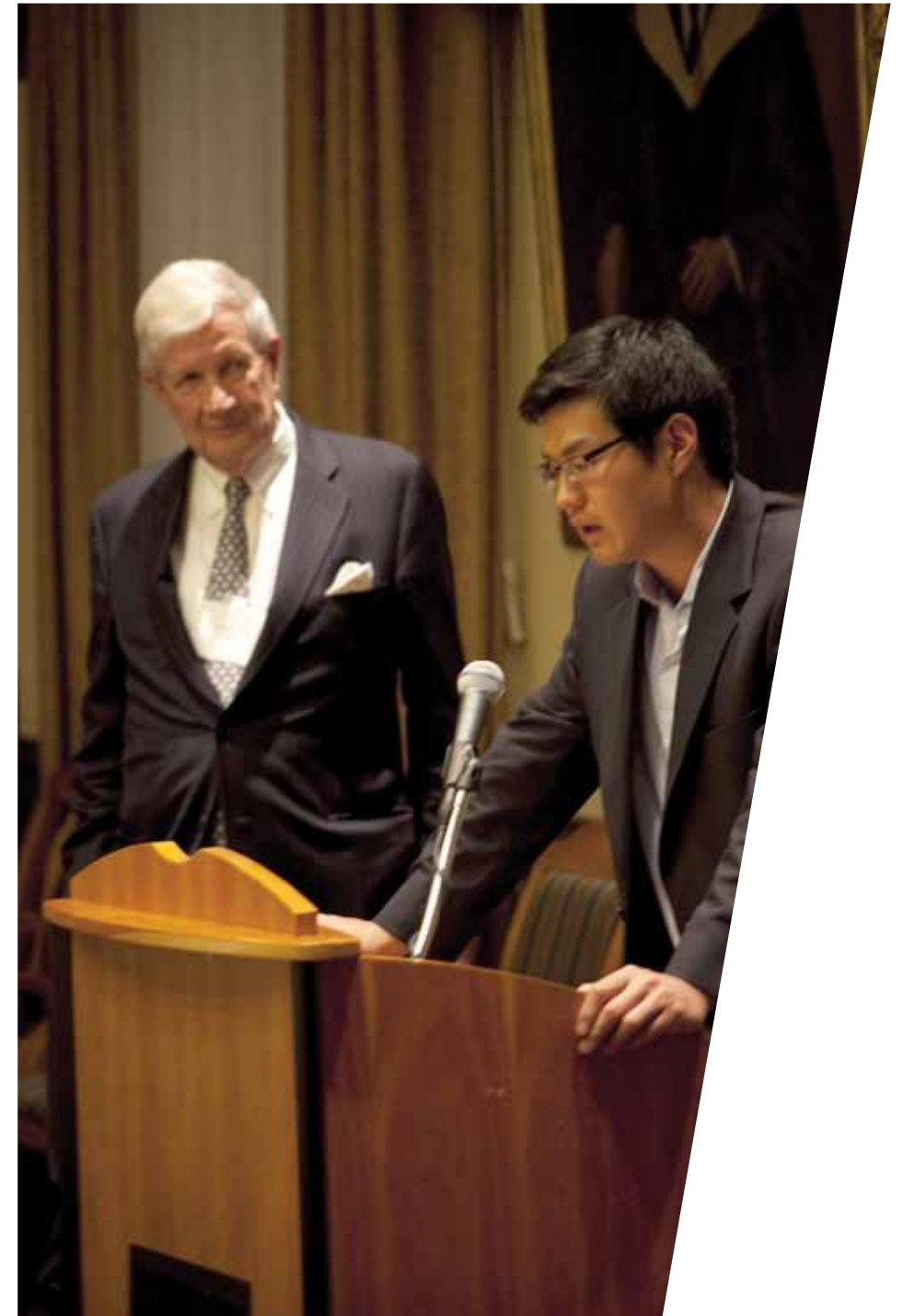

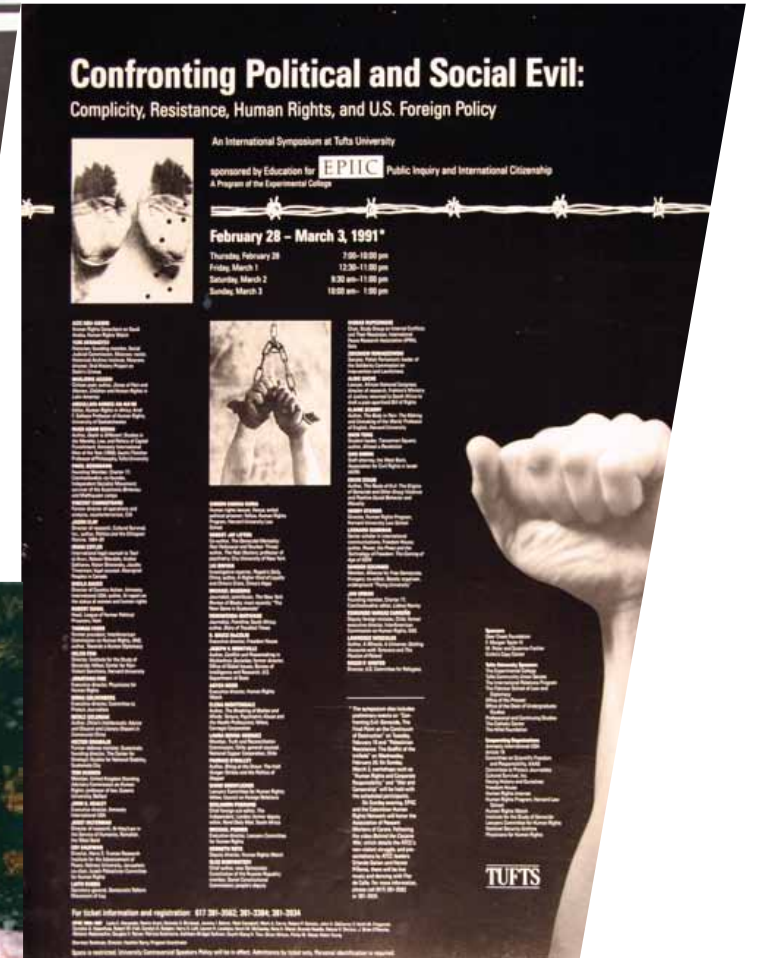

PJTT/IGL History

In 1991 Tim Phillips, Co-Chair and Co-Founder of the Project on Justice in Times of Transition (PJTT), was invited by Sherman Teichman to attend the Education for Public Inquiry and International Citizenship (EPIIC) Symposium “Confronting Political & Social Evil”, a program of the Institute for Global Leadership (IGL) at Tufts University. At this conference, Tim Phillips was impressed by IGL's experiential learning approach and was inspired in particular by the panel on retributive and restorative justice; and thus began an unofficial partnership. A few months later, in 1992, Mr. Phillips along with Wendy Luers, also Co-Chair of PJTT, organized in Salzburg the conference “Justice in Times of Transition” together with renowned international lawyers, Lloyd Cutler and Herman Schwartz. The Salzburg conference was the birth of the Project on Justice in Times of Transition and it is also credited for launching the field of transitional justice.

After 15 years of contact and informal collaboration which provided opportunities for IGL students to participate in PJTT's high level international programming, the Institute for Global Leadership and the Project on Justice in Times of Transition officially developed a strategic partnership in 2006. This strategic partnership aims to leverage our respective resources to create more powerful and unique hands on learning opportunities for students. Students gain **ACCESS**, as researchers, interns, and participants, to diplomacy and conflict negotiations at the highest levels of government. Our innovative partnership is being formalized through a new joint initiative called **ACCESS**.

ACCESS

A Unique Mentorship Program that Engages Undergraduate Students with Senior Negotiators and Diplomats

ACCESS: A joint mentorship program of the Institute for Global Leadership at Tufts University and the Project on Justice in Times of Transition. This unique initiative facilitates creative and experiential learning at the highest levels and is designed to help students pursue their intellectual interests in international diplomacy and conflict resolution while at the same time creating a launching pad for their future careers in this field. The program also offers seasoned policymakers and practitioners an opportunity to engage and reflect on their careers and experiences.

The program seeks to:

1. Provide students direct access and contact with world leaders by engaging them in real time political events and/or high level research relating to post conflict reconstruction and diplomacy.
2. Provide opportunities for students to expand their education through active involvement in innovative research projects led and mentored by members of PJTT's network of experienced practitioners and leaders.
3. Provide PJTT network members the opportunity to reflect on and share their experiences with students at Tufts University.

ACCESS achieves these goals through three distinctive but interrelated joint initiatives.

These three joint initiatives include:

1. Seminar and Lectures

Seminars

Every academic year the Project on Justice in Times of Transition and the Institute for Global Leadership plan to co-host a seminar or larger research initiative at Tufts University designed to examine an aspect of post conflict transformation using expertise and mentorship of one or more former world leaders and experienced conflict transformation practitioners.

Two pilot classes have already been held and both are successful models for the future:

- The first course, *The Role of Leadership in Conflict Transformation*, explored the impact of leadership in transitional societies through distinguished guest lectures which included senior leaders from some of the most intractable conflicts, such as President Jose Ramos Horta of East Timor, Ambassador Arturo Cruz of Nicaragua, former Deputy Speaker of the Israeli Knesset, Naomi Chazan and Ambassador Nicholas Burns former Under Secretary of State for Political Affairs, in the United States State Department.
- During the 2009/2010 academic year PJTT/IGL featured a course taught by Ambassador William Luers (retired Career Foreign Service Officer with rank of Ambassador and former President of the United Nations Association) titled: *US Experiences in Talking with the Enemy*. This course considered the decision-making process surrounding the efforts of past US administrations to engage with their adversaries. The class opened with an examination of the US effort to open relations in 1933 with the USSR and went on to consider the influence of the Munich Pact in 1938, efforts to open relations with China, Vietnam and Cuba and the current US problems in dealing with Iran and North Korea.

Lecture Series

The Project and the IGL plan to co-host a lecture series around a particular theme, such negotiating with non-state actors, which brings leaders and decision-makers who were integral to facilitating change and development in a war torn societies. Past speakers have included distinguished guests such as Ashraf Ghani, former Finance Minister and Presidential Candidate in Afghanistan and Ram Manikkalingam, the former advisor on the peace process to President Kumaratunga of Sri Lanka. Lectures are podcasted online and shared with policy-makers working in the peacebuilding and human rights field world wide.

Annual cost for each Class: \$30,000

Annual cost for annual Lecture Series (including 10 lectures in an academic year): \$15,000

2. Fellowships for Senior Leaders

Through ACCESS, the PJTT/IGL INSPIRE Fellowship enables world leaders and other distinguished individuals with unique contributions to forging peace in war torn societies to spend four-six weeks on the Tufts University campus. During their stay, Fellows will either teach a PJTT/IGL class or conduct research that involves Tufts students at both the undergraduate and graduate level. In all cases, these fellowships are designed to facilitate student experiential learning through direct involvement and access to the people and places integral to the research subject.

PJTT and the IGL have held three Fellowships in the past:

- **Tim Phillips:** 2002-2003 IGL/PJTT INSPIRE Fellow
Mr. Phillips is the co-Founder of the Project on Justice in Times of Transition and a member of the Club of Madrid's Advisory Board. During his stay at Tufts, Mr. Phillips worked with sixteen students on initiatives in Central America, Sri Lanka, Kosovo, the Basque region of Spain, as well as the creation of the Sovereignty Project, which was an initiative that interviewed 14 global leaders on the future of sovereignty in a globalized world.
- **Ambassador José Maria Argueta:** 2007-2008 IGL/PJTT INSPIRE Fellow
Ambassador José Maria Argueta was the first civilian National Security Advisor of Guatemala after the war and subsequently Ambassador to Peru and Japan. Ambassador Argueta worked with eight Tufts students on a research effort looking at the relationship between poverty and national decision-making by elites in Guatemala. This research resulted in a paper on the Millennium Challenge Corporation's (MCC) criteria for grant making in Guatemala that was discussed during a state visit by President Colom of Guatemala with President Bush in the White House. This effort has subsequently led to the creation of an IGL based student project called Poverty and Power Research Initiative (PPRI) dedicated to researching the role of elites in poverty and violence throughout the developing world, currently including Philippines, Kenya, and Bosnia Herzegovina.
- **Ambassador William Luers:** 2009-2010 IGL/PJTT INSPIRE Fellow
In 2009 Ambassador Luers taught a class, "US Experiences in Talking with the Enemy," where students examined the changing nature of US efforts to engage with its enemies from the 1933 opening of relations with the USSR to the current US problems in dealing with Iran, Cuba and North Korea.

3. Student On-Site Research Travel Grants

Both the Fellowships and the seminars are designed to facilitate direct student engagement in real life situations relating to post war conflict management and diplomacy. Through the ACCESS student travel grant program, students are given funds to support their field research, internships, or involvement in programming related to international diplomacy and conflict management.

In the past three years, PJTT and IGL have engaged over 50 students in their joint projects. This support has included travel to countries as varied as Colombia, Guatemala, Kosovo, the Philippines, Spain, and Sri Lanka. It has also entailed participation at high-level meetings of the Club of Madrid, PJTT, and the Clinton Global Initiative among others.

Through ACCESS, the IGL and PJTT provide unparalleled opportunities for students and senior international leaders to interact and collaborate on high profile foreign policy challenges. This initiative uniquely provides the ability for mentoring, research and interaction, and creating a new and innovative model for experiential learning.

“When I was a sophomore taking the IGL program EPIIC, I met Tim Phillips from the PJTT who was then INSPIRE Practitioner-in-Residence Fellow at the IGL. Over the course of an afternoon, we dreamed up an idea to study the lessons-learned from the Central American peace process. With the support of the IGL and PJTT, four other students and I began a research project that culminated in a historic conference in Toledo, Spain where we brought together over 40 protagonists of the Central American peace negotiations, including former guerrilla leaders and heads of state, to reflect on their experiences as well as the future of the region. After college, I worked with the PJTT for a few years before coming to the United Nations to represent Costa Rica in the Security Council. As I often tell my dear friends and mentors at the PJTT and IGL, it is thanks to the opportunities and the great support that I have received from them over the years that I have been able to get where I am today.”

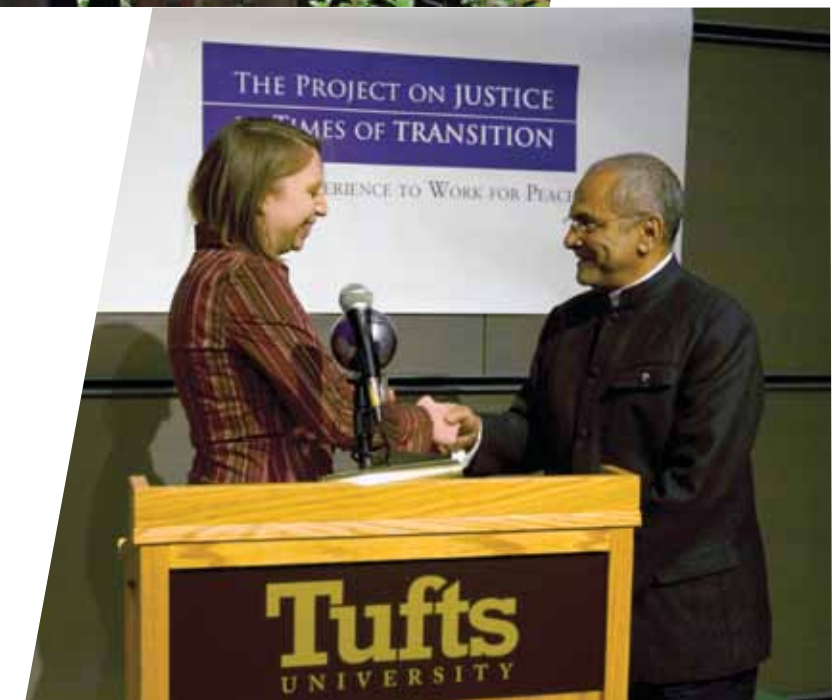

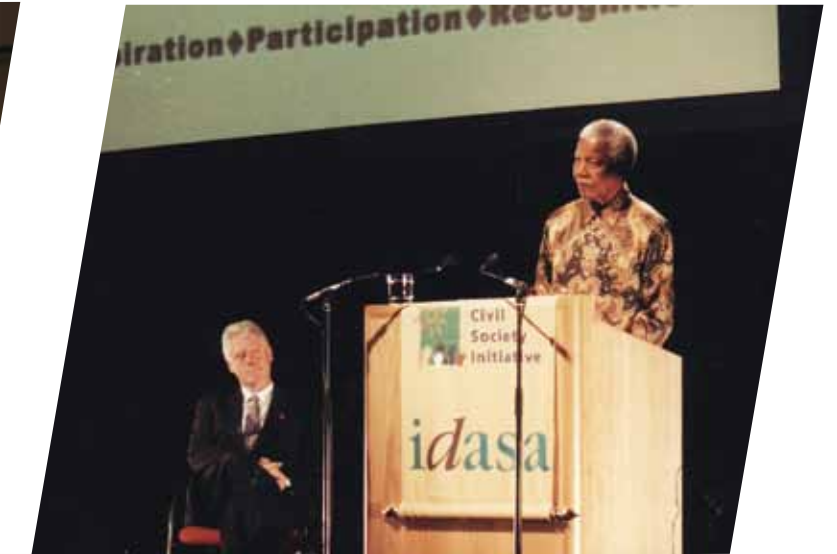
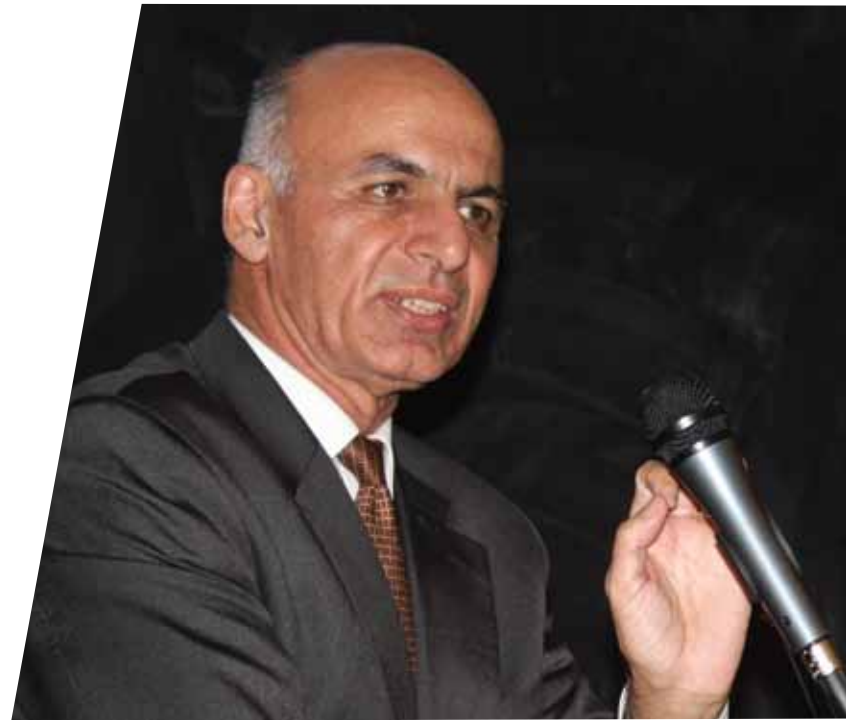
